Change to TAS AGM Date

Teaching ideas from members

Torryburn Lassies (Bk.4) mentions that the same dance is known by different titles but with a different 8-bar ending. So I used the dance in our General Class but shouted out a different 8-bar phrase each time and it proved very enjoyable and I certainly had a lot of fun with it. I would say whether the 2nd couple had to step up and 1s lead up to 2nd place or if 1s had to lead up to the top. I was not that unkind, but apart from that they had to think on their feet and they actually got all the formations right. Ending up with 1s lead up to 1st place and all in for one big circle did seem to finish the dance off on a high.

Margaret found that *Up in the Air* (Bk 20) then *Ladies of Dunse* (Bk 26) were good preparation for teaching *General Stuart's Reel*. All three dances have an emphasis on "SET on the right and MOVE on the left", said rhythmically.

One sequence which worked well for me this term with a class of complete beginners was *Balquidder Strathspey* to teach reels of three and corners, followed by *The Dashing White Sergeant* (teaches set and turn corners) and then the *Duke of Perth*. With that sequence I got a class of dancers who had mostly only been dancing a couple of weeks through the *Duke of Perth* and familiar with reels and corners sufficiently for the nice and easy dance. I've also found what a great dance *Saint Andrews Fair* is for beginners. They can get through it on the first night and it feels as if they've really achieved something. And with all the setting there's plenty of opportunity to catch up when things go wrong – it's a very robust dance.

Spring Fling in Manchester

Spring Fling, the RSCDS weekend school run by young people, for young people, will be held in Manchester from 12-14th April 2013, for participants aged 16-35. Teachers for the weekend are Catherine Livsey, David Queen, and Diane Rooney, and the musicians are Ian Slater, Phill Jones, and Andrew Lyon.

The weekend includes dances on Friday and Saturday nights (which are open to everyone – no age restrictions apply). On Saturday morning, there are Scottish Country dance classes, and in the afternoon, participants can choose between a Ceilidh class, a highland class, or a class on Roy Goldring's dances. Sunday morning sees a dance challenge, which participants will find out about that morning!

Accommodation for the weekend will be at Manchester YHA. Most rooms are en suite, and sleep 4 people each. The advantage of staying in the youth hostel is that you immediately get the chance to make friends with people staying in your room, and, as we know Scottish dancers are friendly and welcoming to new people. Certainly, that is the experience I've had at previous Spring Fling events.

Friday's dance is a 'nice & easy' dance with Ian Slater playing, and Saturday's dance will have music from Scottish Measure. The dances will be held at Sale Masonic Hall. Booking for Spring Fling is open now on the RSCDS website.

Scottish country dancing in Scottish schools Workshop for potential CPD trainers of school teachers

Sunday 28th July 2013 University Hall, St Andrews Summer School

Within the Curriculum for Excellence for Scottish schools there is an opportunity for RSCDS-qualified teachers to provide CPD (Continuing Professional Development) courses to Primary and/or Secondary teachers.

With the completion of the resource pack "Jigs and Reels", the Society is now running a combined session to update previously qualified CPD trainers but more importantly to recruit new RSCDS CPD trainers. Several successful CPD workshops have taken place over the last three years.

- who has experience of teaching either a children's or a beginners class and/or,
- who has significant experience of delivering training to adults and/or,

Teaching Points on the dances in the Diamond Jubilee Collection 2012

We are grateful to Helen Russell for allowing us to re-print the following notes. She points out that the following points are not exhaustive.

1. The Royal Patron

Bar 4 1st couple should be on women's sideline at the end of bar 4.
 Bars 13-16 To begin the turn, the man takes a long step down towards his partner. 1st couple finish shoulder to shoulder facing 3rd couple, not back to back, as stated in the original instructions.
 Bars 21-24 3rd couple need to remember to set and cross.
 Bars 29-32 This is a turn requiring short steps. At the end of this left hand turn the 1st woman may stay facing out ready to cast. 2nd couple need to remember to set and cross. 2nd couple

and 1st couple can cover as they exit from the cross and turn respectively.

2. The Castle of Mey

Bar 16 2nd couple finish the double figure of eight flat.

3. Mist o'er the Loch

Bars 13-16 1st couple, with 2nd woman and 3rd man, dance half rights and lefts on the diagonal.

1st couple, with 2nd man and 3rd woman, dance a variation on half rights and lefts on the diagonal. To begin 1st man dances diagonally up and 1st woman dances diagonally down.

N.B. It may help to note that 1st man goes up, down, down and up, while 1st woman goes down, up, up and down.

Bars 17 and 31 Ensure that hands are released before starting to cast.

4. Rodney's Rant

Bars 9-16 2nd, 1st and 3rd couples dance two consecutive half rights and lefts on the diagonal.

Bar 32 All cover back to place.

5. Orwell Lodge Strathspey

Bars 13-16	1st couple dance a half reel of four with second corners and finish all on opposite sides in the order 3, 1, 2. 1st couple do not pass by the right, as stated in the original instructions.
Bars 19-20 and 23-24	In order to give 2nd and 3rd couples room to cast, 1st couple may dance slightly towards each other to start the petronella turn.
Bars 27-28	2nd couple must turn once round in two bars.

6. Burnaby at Forty

Bars 21-24, 29-32, 33-40 Long steps to cross diagonally, shorter steps to cast.

Chasing the Eclipse

32 Bar Strathspey for 3 couples in a 3 couple set

Bars:

- 1-8: 1st couple set, dance down below third couple, cast up to 2nd place and pass left shoulder to face first corner. 2nd couple step up on bars 3-4.
- 9-16: 2nd, 1st, and 3rd couples dance reels of three on the side, 1st man and 3rd woman, 1st woman and 2nd man passing right shoulder. 1st couple finish in the center, facing 1st corner.
- 17-24: 1st couple set to first corners, dance ³/₄ round partner by the right shoulder, set to second corners, and dance round partner to 2nd place on own side and face out.
- 25-32: Promenade Chain progression.
 - 25-26: 2nd and 3rd couples turn partner ¾ with right hands while 1st couple dance clockwise ¼ round the set.
 - 27-30: 2nd man and 3rd woman turn with left hands 1½ times while 1st man and 2nd woman take promenade hold and 1st woman and 3rd man take reverse promenade hold and dance clockwise ½ way round the set.
 - 31-32: 3rd and 2nd couples turn partner ³/₄ with right hands to own sides while 1st couple dance clockwise ¹/₄ round the set to end in 2nd place.

The new positions are 3,1,2. Repeat from new positions.

Note: the movement in bars 25-32 was devised by Tim Wilson.

Devised for Mike and Eilean Yates, formerly of Shelby North Carolina, by Sandy Gallamore in February, 2013. The Yates' have been a pillar of dancing in the Carolinas for decades and also been involved in the dancing at the Loch Norman Highland Games almost since the beginning.

Beyond dancing, Mike's passion for viewing solar eclipses have taken them all over the world. You can detect that in the Promenade Chain progression (thanks, Mary!)

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
